To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Pursuant to Section 5 of Article 63 of the Amendments to the Constitution, we are today signing House Bill 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutions and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements,” and returning certain portions to you for reconsideration.

The Fiscal Year 2018 (FY18) budget, the third of this administration, once again provides funding for stronger and safer communities, education, health care coverage, transportation, and important social service programs for mental health, substance misuse, children, and seniors.

The \$39.43 billion spending plan represents a 1.7% growth rate over estimated spending in Fiscal Year 2017 (FY17),¹ well within the rate of projected state tax revenue growth of 2.7%. This budget does not rely upon new taxes or fees to achieve balance and assumes an estimated \$98.4 million increase to the Stabilization Fund. For the third year in a row, the signed budget also reduces the use of one-time revenue to \$125 million, which is approximately 90% less than the one-time revenue use in the Fiscal Year 2015 (FY15) budget.

Some key FY18 budget highlights:

¹ This calculation excludes from both years transfers to the Medical Assistance Trust Fund, which provides payments to certain publicly-supported hospitals.

Building Stronger and Safer Communities:

- An increase in Unrestricted Local Aid of \$39.9 million, or 3.9%, to \$1.062 billion
- \$6.8 million for the Community Compact related programs, in which nearly 300 communities have joined since its inception in 2015
- \$6 million for Shannon Grants to support gang-prevention initiatives
- \$3.5 million for a new State Police division focused on homeland security, criminal intelligence, and counter-terrorism
- \$2.9 million for a new state police class of 145 recruits

Education:

- The highest-ever level for Chapter 70 education aid, \$4.747 billion, an increase of \$118.9 M (2.6%) over FY17 estimated spending
 - At least a \$30 per pupil increase for all 322 operating districts
 - An increase of \$25 million to be used as a down payment on the rising cost of health care for retirees
- \$38.5 million for Early Education Care rate increases

Mental Health:

- \$60 million for a new clinical care contract for Bridgewater State Hospital
- A \$1.75 million increase for 45 additional Section 35 beds for men in MASAC Plymouth

Health and Human Services:

- A total of \$185.3 million for substance misuse, not including MassHealth spending, an increase of over 50% since FY15
- \$23.1 million for the Department of Developmental Services “Turning 22” Program, a \$5.6 million increase
- A \$9.8 million increase to support the annualization of 450 new hires at the Department of Children and Families

Veterans:

- A new \$2,000 annual tax credit for companies with 100 or fewer employees that hire an unemployed veteran
- An update to the \$2,000 benefit for Gold Star Families to provide retroactive benefit payments

Workforce Skills and Housing:

- Learn to Earn—\$1 million for a new initiative to provide employment and credentials for unemployed and underemployed individuals
- A \$9.1 million increase, to a total \$92.7 million, for the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program including new standards to allow families to keep their vouchers as they grow their income

Transportation:

- An transfer of \$127 million in operating funds to the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA), which combined with \$60 million in new capital funding in the administration's FY18 Capital Investment Plan, totals \$187 million in state support for the MBTA over and above the \$1 billion sales tax transfer
- A new law authorizing Pension Reserves Investment Management Board to manage the assets for MBTA retirees

We appreciate the work of the Legislature in delivering the FY18 conference report. There remain, however, additional items within the conference committee report that we believe require additional corrective actions, including revenue, spending, and a comprehensive package to address MassHealth and insurance market reforms.

Based upon projected FY17 year-end revenue and within a range of updated forecasts from economists provided last month, our actions approving the budget today assume \$749 million less in state tax revenue than originally projected for FY18. This amount is \$99 million lower than the assumptions upon which the conference report was based.

While the conference committee report provides a new \$104 million reserve that authorizes the administration to address some known deficiencies, we believe there are \$198 million in unavoidable deficiencies that will need to be addressed in FY18, including the Committee for Public Counsel Services and the Emergency Assistance program. For this reason, we are filing a separate FY18 supplemental budget of \$94 million in conjunction with today's budget signing.

We are also returning with amendment and filing additional components of our MassHealth reform package. Passage of this package in its entirety, a set of changes supported by many stakeholders, is essential to the long-term sustainability of the MassHealth program and the state budget.

Given these factors and as required, we are taking corrective measures in order to balance the budget and maintain fiscal stability. Specifically, we are vetoing \$320 million gross (\$193 million net) in line-item and outside section spending. Of the 150 outside sections presented in the conference report, we are signing 116, vetoing 9 and amending 25.

Therefore:

- We are reducing appropriation amounts in items of section 2 of House 3800 that are enumerated in Attachment A of this message, by the amount and for the reasons set forth in that Attachment;
- We are disapproving, or striking wording in, items of section 2 of House 3800 also set forth in Attachment A, for the reasons set forth in that Attachment;

- We are disapproving those sections of House 3800 itemized in Attachment B of this message for the reasons set forth in that Attachment; and
- Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, we are returning sections 5, 8, 13, 16, 17, 30, 60-67, 87, 93, 109-111, 122, 125, 138, 146, 147 and 150 with recommendations for amendment. Our reasons for doing so and the recommended amendments are set forth in separate letters dated today which are included with this message as Attachments C to K, inclusive.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Section 5 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutional and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

Section 5 would require MassDOT, once a month, to telephone every electronic toll collection system account holder who has more than \$100 in outstanding fees and fines to assist the account holder in bringing their account balance current. We recognize that with the recent transition to all-electronic tolling, toll payers may benefit from increased communication about their accounts.

MassDOT already issues multiple notices to each account holder who has accrued a past-due balance. In doing so, MassDOT utilizes the national change of address registry to ensure that it has the best contact information for each account holder. Implementing a system to contact every account holder who has more than \$100 in outstanding fees or fines would require a change to MassDOT’s existing vendor contract and would cause additional costs.

Nonetheless, there is a value in ensuring that account holders with the highest accrued balances are aware of their obligation to pay and the steps they can take to address their account balance.

For these reasons, I recommend that Section 5 be amended by striking out the text and inserting in place thereof the following text:-

SECTION 5. Section 13 of chapter 6C of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby amended by adding the following subsection:-

(d) The department shall regularly review fees and fines assessed on electronic toll collection system account holders. Not less than once each month, the department shall contact accounts with more than \$500 in outstanding fees and fines assessed on unpaid tolls to update the account holder on the account status and provide guidance as to what actions the account holder may take to remedy the account balance. Efforts to contact account holders shall include comparing address information on file with the national change of address registry, communicating with the account holder by email and communicating with the account holder by phone.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Section 8 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutions and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

Section 8 establishes a trust fund for Nickerson State Park, like similar trust funds established in recent years for other state recreational facilities. I support efforts to ensure adequate resources to fund the long-term sustainability of these important park facilities.

As enacted, however, section 8 would raise fees on Massachusetts residents. For this reason, I propose to raise a similar amount of revenue for Nickerson State Park, exclusively from amounts collected from out-of-state residents.

Accordingly, I recommend that Section 8 be amended by striking out the text and inserting in place thereof the following text:-

SECTION 8. Chapter 10 of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby amended by inserting after section 35DDD the following section:-

Section 35EEE. (a) There shall be a Nickerson State Park Trust Fund to be used, without further appropriation, for the long-term preservation and maintenance of Nickerson State

Park in the town of Brewster. Any balance in the fund at the end of a fiscal year shall not revert to the General Fund but shall remain available for expenditure in subsequent fiscal years. No expenditure made from the fund shall cause the fund to become deficient at any point during a fiscal year.

(b) The department of conservation and recreation shall impose a surcharge of \$5 upon each fee charged and collected for admission to camping in Nickerson State Park for out-of-state residents. The additional money collected from the surcharge shall be deposited into the Nickerson State Park Trust Fund.

(c) An annual report, which shall include projects undertaken, expenditures made, and income received by the fund, shall be submitted to the clerks of the house of representatives and the senate and to the house and senate committees on ways and means not later than December 31.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Section 13 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutions and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

Section 13 requires home care agencies to collect and submit information pertaining to each of their employees, including name, home address, and identification number to the department of elder affairs for the purposes of maintaining a home care worker registry. The proposal requires that all of the information reported and maintained in the registry be provided to an employee organization, upon request; and requires that a limited subset of this information be made publicly available. The department of elder affairs is charged with promulgating regulations to implement these requirements.

This proposal, as written, presents privacy concerns for home care workers. Under the legislation, employee organizations are granted full access to the personal information of these workers, without providing the workers with a process to object to the disclosure of such information. In order to address these privacy and due process concerns, I propose several changes that will limit the personal information that may be disseminated and afford home care workers with a process to opt-out of the registry.

For these reasons, I recommend that Section 13 be amended by striking out the text and inserting in place thereof the following text:-

SECTION 13. Chapter 19A of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after section 4C the following section:-

Section 4D. (a) As used in this section, the following terms shall, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, have the following meanings:-

“Organization”, a labor union or other organization, agency, or employee representation committee, association, group or plan in which employees participate and which exists in whole or in part for the purpose of dealing with employers concerning matters incidental to employment relationships.

“Home care worker”, a person employed by a home care worker agency to provide personal care, homemaker, companion or chore services under the home care program established in section 4.

“Home care worker agency”, an entity employing home care workers to provide services under the home care program established in section 4 that is under contract with an aging services access point established pursuant to section 4B.

(b) The department shall establish and maintain a home care worker registry for home care workers employed by a home care worker agency. A home care worker agency shall report the required home care worker registry information for each home care worker it employs on a paid, unpaid, temporary or permanent basis who is not exempt from the reporting requirement. Any exemptions from reporting shall be established in regulations promulgated by the department.

The department shall collect the following reported information concerning each home care worker: (i) the worker’s full name; (ii) their assigned unique identification number; (iii) their gender; (iv) their mailing address; (v) the full legal name of any home care worker agency employing the home care worker; (vi) the worker’s job title; and (vii) a list of home care trainings or certifications completed by the home care worker.

Reported information for each employed home care worker shall be submitted and regularly updated by each home care worker agency subject to this section. A home care worker agency shall collect and maintain the required information and submit updated information in a timely manner as determined by the department. A home care worker shall not be responsible for any costs related to the registry.

The department shall only make each home care worker’s full name, identification number, name of any home care worker agency employing the home care worker and a list of home care trainings or certifications completed by the home care worker available to the public unless such information is exempt from disclosure by the department; provided, that the department shall permit a home care worker to opt out of providing the worker’s full name; their gender; and their mailing address to the department. Upon request from an organization, home care worker agency or aging services access point,

the department shall provide non-exempt reported information to such entity unless the home care worker has opted out.

The department shall promulgate rules and regulations and shall provide such forms and notifications as may be necessary to implement this section; provided, however, that the department shall minimize any duplicate reporting that may be required of home care agencies.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Sections 16, 17, 60-67, inclusive, 93, 110, 111, 122, 146, 147 and 150 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutions and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

These sections establish a temporary, two-pronged approach to an employer contribution that builds off of the existing employer medical assistance contribution (EMAC) and is expected to generate \$200 million in revenue in Fiscal Year 2018. The employer contribution represents an important component of a larger set of reforms necessary to attain a sustainable MassHealth program and a balanced budget in Fiscal Year 2018.

These sections, however, must not be considered in isolation of other measures needed to manage spending in the MassHealth program. Absent other reforms, this proposal imposes an unfair burden on Massachusetts’ employers without making the structural reforms essential to MassHealth’s long-term sustainability. Without further action, MassHealth growth will continue to crowd out other budget priorities and corrode the commercial insurance market.

Therefore, I am proposing a more comprehensive and balanced approach that reinforces the shared commitment between the private and public sectors under Chapter 58. In addition to the employer contribution, I am recommending several reforms, including initiatives that would better align the MassHealth program with commercial insurance products and coverage, and measures to ensure MassHealth is a secondary payer when individuals have access to employer-sponsored health insurance coverage. This proposal will provide savings in Fiscal Year 2018, as well as longer term savings that lay the framework for a more sustainable MassHealth program.

The MassHealth funding level included in the conference report assumes savings and revenues made possible only through the passage of this reform package. The Fiscal Year 2018 savings also assume we will have the federal waiver necessary to accomplish some of these reforms within 2018, which will require legislative approval by the end of the summer. If action is not taken within a timely manner, corrective budgetary measures will be necessary to account for the foregone revenues and savings associated with this proposal. Therefore, I respectfully request that the Legislature hold a public hearing on this proposal within 30 days, and act upon this proposal within 60 days to ensure we achieve the necessary savings and revenues in Fiscal Year 2018.

Finally, I am filing today, as separate legislation, a set of commercial insurance market reform proposals that were previously included in the legislative package that was shared with budget conferees.

In order to protect taxpayers and preserve the health care safety net for those who need it, I recommend striking sections 16, 17, 60-67, inclusive, 93, 110, 111, 122, 146, 147 and 150 and replacing them with the following language:-

SECTION 1. Section 8A of chapter 23H of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby amended by inserting after the word "system", in line 2, the following words:- " , the contribution established under section 189A of chapter 149".

SECTION 2. Said section 8A of said chapter 23H is hereby further amended by striking out the words " , the contribution established under section 189A of chapter 149" inserted by section 1.

SECTION 3. Section 7 of said chapter 94C, as so appearing, is hereby amended by striking out the words "practical nurse or a licensed dental hygienist", in lines 80 and 81, and inserting in place thereof the following words:-
practical nurse, or a licensed dental therapist under the supervision of a practitioner as defined in section 1 for the purposes of administering analgesics, anti-inflammatories and antibiotics only, or a licensed dental hygienist.

SECTION 4. Subsection (a) of said section 9 of said chapter 94C, as so appearing, is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph:-
A practitioner, as defined in section 1, may cause controlled substances to be administered under the practitioner's direction by a licensed dental therapist, for the purposes of administering analgesics, anti-inflammatories and antibiotics only.

SECTION 5. Subsection (c) of said section 9 of said chapter 94C, as so appearing, is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph:-

A licensed dental therapist who has obtained a controlled substance from a practitioner, as defined in section 1, for dispensing to an ultimate user under subsection (a) shall return to such practitioner any unused portion of the substance which is no longer required by the patient.

SECTION 6. Section 43A of said chapter 112, as so appearing, is hereby amended by inserting after the definition of “Appropriate supervision” the following 2 definitions:-

“Board”, the board of registration in dentistry or a committee or subcommittee thereof established in the department of public health pursuant to sections 9 and 19 of chapter 13 and sections 43 to 53, inclusive.

“Collaborative management agreement”, a written agreement between a supervising dentist and a dental therapist outlining the procedures, services, responsibilities and limitations of the therapist.

SECTION 7. Said section 43A of said chapter 112, as so appearing, is hereby further amended by inserting after the definition of “Dental hygienist” the following definition:-

“Dental therapist,” a person registered and licensed by the board under section 51B.

SECTION 8. Said section 43A of said chapter 112, as so appearing, is hereby further amended by adding the following definition:-

“Supervising dentist”, a dentist licensed under section 45 of this chapter who enters into a collaborative management agreement with a dental therapist.

SECTION 9. Said chapter 112 is hereby further amended by inserting after section 51A the following section:-

Section 51B. (a) The board may approve a dental therapist education program that meets the standards of the Commission on Dental Accreditation for dental therapist education programs and includes training on serving patients with special needs including, but not limited to, people with developmental disabilities including autism spectrum disorders, mental illness, cognitive impairment, complex medical problems, significant physical limitations and the vulnerable elderly.

Any person of good moral character who (i) successfully completes a board approved dental therapy education program, or who is a full time dental student who has satisfactorily completed at least four full semesters in an accredited dental college in subjects considered by the board as essential for a dental therapist, or who is a graduate of an accredited dental college; (ii) passes a board approved comprehensive, competency-based clinical examination that is administered independently of an institution providing dental therapy education; and (iii) obtains a policy of professional liability insurance and

shows proof of such insurance as required by the board, shall, upon application and payment of a fee, as determined annually by the secretary of administration and finance under section 3B of chapter 7, be issued a license to practice as a dental therapist in accordance with, and to the extent provided by, a collaborative management agreement with a supervising dentist. Dental therapists licensed under this section shall renew licensure biennially, on a date determined by the board, upon application and payment of a fee, as determined by the secretary of administration and finance under section 3B of chapter 7.

Licensure under this section shall authorize a dental therapist to practice as a public health dental hygienist or dental hygienist under section 51. Upon receipt of a certificate of registration under section 45 any license issued hereunder shall be revoked.

(b) A dental therapist shall have practiced under the direct supervision of a supervising dentist for at least 500 hours or completed 1 year of residency before practicing under general supervision.

A dental therapist shall not operate independently of a supervising dentist and shall not perform any service or procedure described in this section except as authorized by a supervising dentist. Before performing a procedure or providing a service under this section, a dental therapist shall enter into a written collaborative management agreement with a supervising dentist. At a minimum, the collaborative management agreement shall address: practice settings, any limitation on services established by the supervising dentist, the level of supervision required for various services or treatment settings, patient populations that may be served, practice protocols, record keeping, management of medical emergencies, quality assurance, administering and dispensing medications and supervision of dental assistants and dental hygienists. A dental therapist may provide the services authorized in practice settings where the supervising dentist is not on-site and has not previously examined the patient, to the extent authorized by the supervising dentist in the collaborative management agreement; provided, that the supervising dentist shall be available for consultation and supervision by telephone or other means of electronic communication.

The collaborative management agreement shall include specific written protocols to govern situations in which the dental therapist encounters a patient who requires services, procedures, or treatment exceeding those which the dental therapist is authorized to provide. The collaborative management agreement may be updated from time to time, shall be signed and maintained by the supervising dentist and the dental therapist and shall be submitted upon request to the board. A supervising dentist shall not have a collaborative management agreement with more than 4 dental therapists at the same time.

(c) To the extent permitted by a collaborative management agreement, and in accordance with the collaborative management agreement, a dental therapist licensed by the board may: (i) perform all acts provided for in the Commission on Dental Accreditation's

dental therapy standards; (ii) interpret radiographs; (iii) place space maintainers; (iv) perform pulpotomies on primary teeth; (v) perform nonsurgical extractions of periodontally diseased permanent teeth with tooth mobility of +3 under general supervision; (vi) supervise dental hygienists and dental assistants; and (vii) dispense and administer analgesics, anti-inflammatories and antibiotics in accordance with state and federal law.

A dental therapist, in accordance with the written collaborative management agreement, shall refer patients to another qualified dental or health care professional to receive any needed services that they are not authorized to provide.

Nothing in this section shall be construed as authorizing a dental therapist to extract a tooth that is unerupted, impacted or needs to be sectioned for removal, or to dispense or administer a narcotic drug as defined in section 1 of chapter 94C.

The supervising dentist shall ensure that a dentist is available to the dental therapist for timely consultation during treatment if needed and shall either provide or arrange with another dentist or specialist to provide the necessary treatment to a patient who requires more treatment than the dental therapist is authorized to provide. The supervising dentist is responsible for directly providing or arranging for another dentist or specialist to provide any necessary advanced services needed by the patient.

(d) The Board may adopt guidelines, rules and regulations governing the licensure and practice of dental therapists to protect the public health, safety and welfare, including without limitation, guidelines for collaborative management agreements, continuing education requirements, license renewal, standards of conduct, and the investigation of complaints, conduct of disciplinary proceedings and grounds for discipline.

SECTION 10. Section 9A of chapter 118E of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph:-

(17) The division may, consistent with the terms and conditions of a demonstration project, deny or terminate MassHealth eligibility for non-disabled persons who would otherwise qualify for a program of medical benefits under this chapter who have access to affordable employer sponsored health insurance. The division shall promulgate regulations to implement this clause. The department of unemployment assistance and the department of revenue shall share wage information, employer information, and other information as necessary to implement this subsection, provided, however, that such information may be shared only in accordance with a written agreement that is consistent with the provisions of 20 C.F.R. Pt 603.

SECTION 11. Said chapter 118E is hereby further amended by adding the following section:-

Section 78. (a) Upon request from the division, an employer shall provide, under oath, health insurance information about an employee who has applied for benefits from a state subsidized health insurance program. An employer receiving information that identifies, or could be used to identify, a MassHealth member or recipient of subsidized health insurance shall not use or disclose such information except as authorized by the division.

(b) Information reported under this section that identifies individual employees by name or health insurance status or is protected health information shall not be a public record under clause Twenty-sixth of section 7 of chapter 4 or under chapter 66. The information may be exchanged among the executive office of health and human service, the commonwealth health insurance connector authority, the department of unemployment assistance, the center for health information and analysis and the department of revenue. An employer who knowingly falsifies or fails to file any information required by this section, or its implementing regulation, shall be subject to a penalty of not less than \$1,000 or more than \$5,000 for each violation.

SECTION 12. Said chapter 118E is hereby further amended by adding the following section:-

Section 79. (a) The division shall create a Health Insurance Responsibility Disclosure form. Every employer with 6 or more employees, doing business in the commonwealth, shall annually complete and submit said form under oath. The form shall indicate whether the employer has offered to pay for or arrange for the purchase of health care insurance and information about such health care insurance such as the premium cost, benefits offered, cost sharing details, eligibility criteria and other information necessary to implement subsection (17) of section 9A. The division may make arrangements with other agencies of the commonwealth, including the department of revenue and the department of unemployment assistance, to assist with the administration of this section. Employers shall provide supplemental information that is necessary to implement said subsection (17) of said section 9A to the division or its designee, upon request. An employer receiving information that identifies, or could be used to identify, a MassHealth member or recipient of subsidized health insurance shall not use or disclose such information except as authorized by the division.

(b) Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, information reported under subsection (a) that identifies individual employees by name or health insurance status or is protected health information shall not be a public record under clause Twenty-sixth of section 7 of chapter 4 or under chapter 66, but the information may be exchanged among the executive office of health and human service, the commonwealth health insurance connector authority, the department of unemployment assistance, the center for health information and analysis and the department of revenue as necessary to implement subsection (17) of section 9A. An employer who knowingly falsifies or fails to file any

information required by this section, or its implementing regulation, shall be subject to a penalty of not less than \$1,000 or more than \$5,000 for each violation.

SECTION 13. Section 189 of chapter 149 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2016 Official Edition, is hereby amended by striking out, in line 8, the figure “.34” and inserting in place thereof the following figure:— .51.

SECTION 14. Said section 189 of said chapter 149, as amended by section 13, is hereby further amended by striking out the figure “.51”, inserted by section 13, and inserting in place thereof the following figure:— .34.

SECTION 15. Said section 189 of said chapter 149, as appearing in the 2016 Official Edition, is hereby further amended by striking out, in line 50, the figure “.12” and inserting in place thereof the following figure:— .18.

SECTION 16. Said section 189 of said chapter 149, as amended by section 15, is hereby further amended by striking out the figure “.18”, inserted by section 15, and inserting in place thereof the following figure:— .12.

SECTION 17. Said section 189 of said chapter 149, as appearing in the 2016 Official Edition, is hereby further amended by striking out, in line 54, the figure “.24” and inserting in place thereof the following figure:— .36.

SECTION 18. Said section 189 of said chapter 149, as amended by section 17, is hereby further amended by striking out the figure “.36”, inserted by section 17, and inserting in place thereof the following figure:— .24.

SECTION 19. Said chapter 149 is hereby amended by inserting after section 189 the following section:-

Section 189A. (a) Each employer, subject to sections 14, 14A and 14C of chapter 151A, except those who employ 5 or fewer employees, shall pay a contribution for each employee who receives health insurance coverage through the division of medical assistance or subsidized insurance through the commonwealth health insurance connector authority. The contribution shall be computed by multiplying the wages the employer paid any such employee by 5 per cent. The department of unemployment assistance, in consultation with the division of medical assistance and the commonwealth health insurance connector authority, shall promulgate implementing regulations, which shall specify the number of days that an individual must receive publicly subsidized health care coverage to cause the assessment. The contribution shall be paid in a manner prescribed by the director of unemployment assistance.

(b) For the purposes of this section, the term "wages" shall mean the “unemployment insurance taxable wage base” as defined in subsection (a)(4) of section 14 of chapter 151A. For the purposes of this paragraph, remuneration shall include remuneration paid

to an individual during the calendar year with respect to employment with a transferring employer, as that term is used in subsection (n) of section 14 of chapter 151A.

(c) Any employer notified of a liability determination under this section may request a hearing on such determination. The request for a hearing shall be filed within 10 days after the mailing of the notice of the determination. If a hearing is requested, the employer shall have a reasonable opportunity for a fair hearing before an impartial hearing officer designated by the director of unemployment assistance. The hearing shall be conducted in accordance with the procedures in subsection (b) of section 39 of chapter 151A. Following the hearing, an aggrieved party may appeal the decision to superior court.

(d) (1) Except where inconsistent with this section, the terms and conditions of chapter 151A that are applicable to the payment and collection of contributions or payments in lieu of contributions shall apply to the same extent to the payment of and the collection of the contribution under this section; provided, however, that such contributions shall not be credited to the employer's account or to the solvency account established under section 14, 14A or 14C of chapter 151A.

(2) The director of unemployment assistance may share information with the commissioner of revenue for the purposes of enforcement and collection of the contribution under this section. The commissioner of revenue may enforce and collect a debt certified by the director as owed under this section in the manner of a tax due and unpaid under chapter 62C; provided, that the remedies authorized in subsection (c) shall be the sole remedies for an employer to dispute a debt so certified, and remedies otherwise available under chapter 62C to dispute a tax assessment shall not be available. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, for purposes of enforcement of this section the commissioner of revenue may disclose to the department of unemployment assistance any information referred to in chapter 62E or any information relating to the commissioner's collection activities under chapter 62C with regard to debts certified by the director.

(e) Data collected by the department of unemployment insurance, the department of revenue, the division of medical assistance and the commonwealth health insurance connector authority under this section shall not be a public record under clause Twenty-sixth of section 7 of chapter 4 or under chapter 66. The department of unemployment insurance, the department of revenue, the division of medical assistance and the commonwealth health insurance connector authority may share information to implement this section.

SECTION 20. Chapter 176Q of the General Laws is hereby amended by striking out section 7A, as so appearing, and inserting in place thereof the following section:-

Section 7A. (a) There shall be a small group incentive program to expand the prevalence of employee health plans offered by small businesses. The program shall be administered by the board, in consultation with the department of public health. The program shall provide subsidies and technical assistance for eligible small groups that offer health plans to employees.

(b) An eligible small group shall be qualified to participate in the program if: (1) the eligible small group purchases group coverage through the connector; and (2) the eligible small group meets certain criteria, as determined by the board, which may include criteria regarding the size of the employer group, the level of employer subsidy of the cost of employee coverage, the average salary of employees in the group, enrollment in a high-value plan that promotes employee wellness, or participation in a plan-administered or employer-administered wellness program.

(c) For eligible small groups participating in the program, the connector shall provide an annual subsidy not to exceed 50 per cent of eligible employer health care costs, as calculated by the board. The connector may seek a state innovation waiver from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services pursuant to 42 U.S.C. s. 18052 to obtain moneys otherwise available under 26 U.S.C. s. 45R to fund this program.

(d) If the director determines that available funds are insufficient to meet the projected costs of enrolling new eligible employers, the director shall impose a cap on enrollment in the program or subsidy amounts available to eligible groups.

(e) The connector shall report annually to the joint committee on community development and small businesses, the joint committee on health care financing and the house and senate committees on ways and means on the enrollment in the small group incentive program and evaluate the impact of the program on expanding health plan participation for small groups.

(f) The connector shall adopt regulations to implement this section.

SECTION 21. Section 79L of chapter 233, as so appearing, is hereby amended by inserting after the word “dentist”, in line 12, the following words:- “, dental therapist”.

SECTION 22. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, there shall be a 5 year moratorium on the addition of any new mandatory health care benefits, except as required by federal law.

SECTION 23. Notwithstanding section 14 of chapter 151A of the General Laws, for calendar year 2018 the experience rate of an employer qualifying therefor under subsection (b) of said section 14 of said chapter 151A shall be the rate which appears in column “D” of paragraph (1) of subsection (i) of said section 14 of said chapter 151A and for calendar year 2019 the experience rate of an employer qualifying therefor under

subsection (b) of said section 14 of said chapter 151A shall be the rate which appears in column "E" of paragraph (1) of subsection (i) of said section 14 of said chapter 151A.

SECTION 24. Notwithstanding section 53 of chapter 118E of the General Laws or any general or special law to the contrary, the executive office of health and human services, subject to federal approval may restructure pharmacy benefits. At least 30 days before implementing benefit changes under this section, the secretary shall file a report with the house and senate committees on ways and means detailing the proposed changes and the anticipated fiscal impact of those changes.

SECTION 25. Notwithstanding section 53 of chapter 118E of the General Laws or any general or special law to the contrary, the executive office of health and human services may restructure or eliminate covered services that are optional benefits under the Medicaid program to generate savings. At least 30 days before implementing benefit changes under this section, the secretary shall file a report with the house and senate committees on ways and means detailing the proposed changes and the anticipated fiscal impact of those changes.

SECTION 26. Notwithstanding sections 9 and 16D of chapter 118E of the General Laws, subject to federal approval under the Commonwealth's 1115 Demonstration, individuals otherwise dually eligible for MassHealth Limited and ConnectorCare shall be eligible for subsidized insurance through the commonwealth health insurance connector authority only.

SECTION 27. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, subject to federal approval under the Commonwealth's 1115 Demonstration, non-disabled adults age 21 through 64 with income above 100% of the federal poverty level, excluding pregnant women and individuals with HIV-AIDS or breast or cervical cancer, shall be determined eligible for and enrolled in subsidized insurance through the Connector only. At least 30 days before implementing eligibility changes under this section, the secretary shall file a report with the house and senate committees on ways and means detailing the proposed changes and the anticipated fiscal impact of those changes.

SECTION 28. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the comptroller shall count as revenue in fiscal year 2018 any increased contributions collected pursuant to sections 13 to 19, inclusive, that are received by the commonwealth on or before August 31, 2018.

SECTION 29. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the comptroller shall count as revenue in fiscal year 2019 any increased contributions collected pursuant to sections 13 to 19, inclusive, that are received by the commonwealth on or after September 1, 2018 and on or before August 31, 2019.

SECTION 30. The division shall not use the authority conferred in Section 10 or enforce the requirements under Section 12 until receipt of approval from the federal government permitting MassHealth to implement eligibility criteria that bars individuals with access to affordable employer sponsored insurance from obtaining insurance coverage through MassHealth.

SECTION 31. Sections 1, 13, 15, 17, 19 and 25 are hereby repealed.

SECTION 32. Notwithstanding section 31, the director of unemployment assistance shall have the authority to collect any outstanding contributions established pursuant to section 189A of chapter 149 of the General Laws for obligations arising prior to January 1, 2020. The collection of any outstanding contributions shall be conducted in accordance with the regulations promulgated by the department of unemployment assistance pursuant to said section 189A of said chapter 149. The director of unemployment assistance may share information with the commissioner of revenue for the purposes of enforcement and collection of said outstanding contributions. The commissioner of revenue may enforce and collect a debt certified by the director as owed under this section in the manner of a tax due and unpaid under chapter 62C; provided, that the remedies authorized under department of unemployment assistance regulation shall be the sole remedies for an employer to dispute a debt so certified, and remedies otherwise available under chapter 62C to dispute a tax assessment shall not be available. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, for purposes of enforcement of this section the commissioner of revenue may disclose to the department of unemployment assistance any information referred to in chapter 62E or any information relating to the commissioner's collection activities under chapter 62C with regard to debts certified by the director.

SECTION 33. Sections 1, 3 to 9, inclusive, 13, 15, 17, 19, and 21 shall take effect on January 1, 2018.

SECTION 34. Sections 2, 14, 16, 18, 31 and 32 shall take effect on December 31, 2019.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Section 30 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutions and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

Section 30 proposes to allow for the creation of “Community Benefit Districts.” These are areas in which a group of property owners, with the approval of the city or town, agree to a program of assessments to pay for benefits that accrue to the properties assessed. The concept is similar in many respects to Business Improvement Districts, which already are authorized by the General Laws.

The Legislature passed a similar proposal last summer as part of House Bill 4569, “An Act Relative to Job Creation and Workforce Development.” However, I vetoed the section establishing Community Benefit Districts. At the time, I wrote:

While I generally support efforts to reform Business Improvement Districts, I cannot support some of the details in the bill as presented to me and am therefore disapproving this section. The bill includes a presumption that all manner of tax-exempt entities—from non-profits to houses of worship to governmental entities—would be included among the persons and entities required to pay assessments levied in the district despite their tax-exempt status. Nor does the bill mandate protections for residential property owners who are

entitled to tax abatements under existing law, such as the elderly, the blind, and qualifying veterans. Additionally, I am concerned that the proposed criteria for creating a Community Benefit District do not include a requirement that even a simple majority of affected property owners support the creation of the district.

These three specific concerns were illustrative of issues I thought should be addressed before authorizing the creation of Community Benefit Districts. I commend the Legislature for addressing issues relating to tax exempt entities and residential property owners who are entitled to tax abatements. The proposal as written provides adequate protection for these groups. However, the third issue I raised last summer, the need for majority support before the tools of government may be used to take money from property owners, remains unaddressed. In addition, a number of clarifications to the statutory language could make it easier for municipal officials and other proponents to implement this law if it is enacted.

Our administration looks forward to working collaboratively with the House and Senate to address these issues and make sure that Community Benefit Districts are structured in a way that ensures that assessments will be spent in a responsible fashion should a majority of participating property owners choose to create a district. To that end, I am recommending an amendment as described below. This amendment would, among other changes:

- Require a majority vote of participating property owners to form a community benefit district;
- Require that assessments paid by a property owner be reasonably proportionate to the benefit received;
- Provide enhanced protections for smaller property owners in the formation process in situations where a single large property owner or group of related property owners will pay a significant portion of the assessments to be levied;
- Promote responsible management of a district by a CBD corporation, including by making its board members subject to the ethics laws; and
- Make other technical changes that should clarify for municipal officials and CBD proponents how a district is created, managed and potentially dissolved when it no longer is serving its intended purpose.

For these reasons, I recommend that Section 30 be amended by striking out the proposed language and inserting in place thereof the following text:-

SECTION 30. The General Laws are hereby amended by inserting after Chapter 40W the following chapter:-

Chapter 40X. Community Benefit Districts

Section 1. Definitions

As used in this chapter, the following words shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

“Community benefit district” or “district”, a contiguous geographic area with clearly defined boundaries, formed pursuant to this chapter.

“CBD corporation”, the nonprofit corporation established pursuant to section 2 to oversee the affairs of the district and ensure the implementation of the CBD management plan.

“CBD assessments”, the annual assessments imposed on participating property owners in the district to pay for the services or improvements specified in the CBD management plan.

“CBD property”, a parcel of real property located within a community benefit district, regardless of use of the parcel or the status of its owner as a participating property owner.

“CBD management plan”, the operating plan for the community benefit district containing all of the information required by section 5, as such plan may be amended from time to time in accordance with section 9.

“Exempt owner”, a property owner who is exempted from paying a CBD assessment in accordance with subsection (b) of section 6.

“Participating property owner”, an owner of CBD property who is required to pay a CBD assessment and any exempt owner who voluntarily agrees, in a binding written agreement, to support the district activities through a cash payment or in-kind services.

“Petition”, a petition submitted by property owners to the municipality as set forth in section 3.

“Petition signer”, a person who signs the petition to establish a community benefit district.

“Property owner”, the record owner or owners of the fee simple title of a CBD property.

“Standard government services”, governmental functions, programs, activities, facilities, improvements and other services that a municipality is authorized to perform or provide and that are paid for out of the municipal government budget.

“Supplemental services”, the provision of programs, public services, activities, amenities or information in addition to the standard government services provided to the CBD.

Section 2. CBD corporation.

(a) A CBD corporation shall be established pursuant to section 3 of chapter 180 of the General Laws. The CBD corporation shall be subject to the requirements set forth in

said chapter 180 and sections 18 to 35 of chapter 68, and shall comply with the public charity reporting requirements of section 8F of chapter 12.

(b) Each CBD corporation shall have a board of directors to manage the affairs of the CBD corporation and ensure the implementation of the CBD management plan. Board members shall be selected by majority vote of CBD property owners. At least 51 per cent of the board shall be composed of participating property owners or their designees. The remaining board members may be selected from stakeholders in the community. CBD board members shall be deemed to be special municipal employees for purposes of chapter 268A and shall be subject to all the provisions of said chapter 268A with respect thereto.

(c) The articles of incorporation and bylaws of the CBD corporation shall be included in any petition to establish a CBD and shall be subject to the approval of the municipal legislative body. Any amendment to said articles or bylaws shall be subject to the approval of the municipal legislative body.

Section 3. Petition to establish a district

(a) The organization of a community benefit district shall be initiated by a petition of property owners within the proposed district. Such petition shall be filed in the office of the clerk of the municipality and contain the following:

(i) the identity of the property owner, the assessed value and the assessor's parcel identification number for each CBD property;

(ii) the signatures of the property owners in the proposed district who support the establishment of the district;

(iii) a description of and a site map delineating the boundaries of the proposed district;

(iv) the identity and address of the CBD corporation, including its initial set of directors and officers and a copy of its articles of incorporation and by-laws;

(v) a CBD management plan, including all of the information required pursuant to section 5.

(b) Each petition signer shall include with his or her signature the assessor's parcel identification number of the CBD property owned by the petition signer. If the property owner is not a natural person, the petition signer also shall include the name of the property owner and the petition signer's title, if applicable. The petition signer's signature shall constitute a certification under pains and penalty of perjury of his or her authority to sign the petition on behalf of the property owner.

(c) On the same day that said petition is filed with the clerk of the municipality, the petition signers shall file a copy of the petition with the undersecretary of housing and community development and the secretary of housing and economic development. Said secretary and undersecretary may provide to a municipal legislative body written

comments on such petition. The secretary of housing and economic development may, in the secretary's discretion, promulgate regulations for the review and approval of petitions submitted pursuant to this chapter.

(d) Within 3 days after receipt of a petition, the clerk of the municipality shall provide a copy of the petition to the municipal assessor. Within 30 days after receipt of a petition, the assessor shall confirm to the municipal chief executive officer whether the information set forth in a petition is consistent with ownership and valuation information maintained by the assessor. In the event of a discrepancy between the information set forth in a petition and the information maintained by the assessor, the municipal chief executive officer may request additional information from the petition signers to resolve the discrepancy. To determine the authority of a petition signer to act on behalf of a CBD property owner that is an entity other than a natural person, the municipal chief executive officer may rely on a good standing certificate from the secretary of the commonwealth or other independent confirmation of the authority of a petition signer to sign the petition on behalf of the property owner.

Section 4. Municipal approval of a proposed district

(a) A municipal legislative body may approve a petition to establish a community benefit district upon a finding by the municipal chief executive officer that:

(i) Petition signers are property owners who will pay more than 50 per cent of the total CBD assessments proposed to be levied in the district; provided, however, if any participating property owner, or group of related property owners as determined under subsection (b), will pay more than 20 percent of the proposed CBD assessments, then for purposes of determining compliance with the 50 percent threshold, the amount of CBD assessment attributable to such property owner or group of related property owners shall be reduced to an amount equal to 20 percent of the total CBD assessments.

(ii) If there are more than 4 unrelated property owners in the proposed district, more than 50 per cent of the total participating property owners have signed the petition; and if there are not more than unrelated 4 property owners in the proposed district, all participating property owners have signed the petition.

(iii) The CBD assessments are structured to require property owners to contribute to the cost providing services within the district in proportion to the benefits anticipated to be received.

(iv) The total CBD assessments to be collected in any 1 year do not exceed 1/2 of 1 per cent of the sum of the assessed valuation of the CBD property owned by participating property owners.

(v) The CBD management plan meets the requirements of section 5.

(vi) The CBD assessments comply with the requirements of section 6.

(vii) The CBD assessments will not impose undue financial hardship on property owners within the district, or alternatively, the CBD management plan allows a waiver for property owners who can demonstrate financial hardship.

(b) The municipal legislative body may request confirmation from the assessor that the requirements in clause (i) and (ii) of subsection (a) have been met. For purposes of determining compliance with said clauses (i) and (ii) the municipal legislative body, in its discretion, may determine whether property owners are related and may require that any property owner that is an entity other than a natural person to disclose of all its owners, members, partners, or other beneficiaries.

(c) In the case of a city, the municipal legislative body, and in the case of a town, the municipal chief executive officer, shall hold a public hearing on the CBD petition not more than 60 days following receipt of the petition by the clerk of the municipality. The clerk of the municipality shall send written notification of the hearing to each CBD property owner not less than 14 days and not more than 30 days before the hearing. Such notice shall be mailed to the address listed in the property tax records. Notice of the hearing shall be published for 2 consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the area, the last publication being not fewer than 14 days before the hearing and posted on the municipality's website. The notices required by this subsection shall include the proposed boundaries of the CBD, the schedule of proposed CBD assessments, a summary of supplemental services to be provided in the district, and notice of where the property owner may obtain a full copy of the management plan.

(d) Not more than 45 days after the close of the public hearing, if the municipal chief executive officer has made the findings required in subsection (a) then the municipal legislative body may, in its sole discretion, approve a petition and establish the community benefit district. A vote to approve a district may be subject to such conditions as the municipal legislative body determines are in the public interest. The approval shall include authorization for the municipality to enter into an agreement with the CBD corporation with respect to operations and funding consistent with the approved management plan, if applicable. The CBD corporation may commence operations 30 days after the municipal approval becomes final.

(e) Notice of the establishment of the community benefit district shall be mailed or delivered to each CBD property owner. The notice shall include the amount of the CBD assessment applicable to said CBD property owner, the projected total of CBD assessments in the district as a whole, and the supplemental services to be provided within the district. In addition to such individual notices, notice that the district has been approved shall be published for 2 consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the area, the last publication being not more than 30 days after the vote to declare the district organized and posted on the municipality's website.

Section 5. CBD management plan

(a) A CBD management plan shall include:

(i) A clear statement of the purpose or purposes for which the district has been formed, which may include retaining or recruiting business; administering and managing central and neighborhood business districts; promoting economic development; managing parking within the district; designing, engineering, constructing, maintaining or operating buildings, facilities, urban streetscapes or infrastructures within the district to further economic development and public purposes; conducting historic preservation activities within the district; leasing, owning, acquiring, or optioning real property within the district; owning and managing parks, public spaces and community facilities within the district; supplementing maintenance, security, or sanitation; planning and designing services; formulating a fee structure; accumulating interest; incurring costs or indebtedness; entering into contracts; suing and being sued; employing legal and accounting services; undertaking planning, feasibility and market analyses; developing common marketing and promotional activities; engaging in placemaking, programming, and event management within the district; soliciting donations, sponsorships and grants; operating transit services within the district; and supporting public art, human and environmental services related to the enhancement of the district or other supplemental services or programs that would further the purposes of this chapter;

(ii) A description of the supplemental services proposed to be provided in the district and paid for with CBD assessments;

(iii) A schedule of the CBD assessments to be made by each of the participating property owners within the CBD, and the percentage of the total assessments to be paid by each of the participating property owners;

(iv) The commitments, if any, of exempt property owners to contribute voluntary payments or in-kind services, and the means of enforcing such commitments;

(v) A budget outlining the cost of the improvements to be constructed and services and activities proposed to be provided in the district; and

(vi) Staffing required to implement the CBD management plan, which may include private nonprofit, for-profit or public agency contractors or subcontractors.

(b) A CBD management plan may include:

(i) Criteria for waiving the CBD assessment for any property owner within the district who demonstrates that the imposition of the CBD assessment would create a significant financial hardship, provided that such waivers shall be requested and granted on an annual basis; and

(ii) A mechanism for reimbursing the municipality for the costs incurred in reviewing the petition and for costs incurred in collecting the CBD assessments.

(c) The CBD corporation shall review the CBD management plan at least once every 3 years and propose such amendments as are necessary to achieve the goals of the district. Amendments to the CBD management plan shall be made in accordance with section 8. Amendments shall become effective upon approval of the municipal

legislative body in accordance with section 8. The CBD corporation shall provide written notice of proposed and final amendments to each CBD property owner.

Section 6. CBD assessments; exemptions

(a) CBD assessments for each participating property owner shall be determined by a formula set forth in the management plan; provided that the total CBD assessments to be collected in any 1 year do not exceed 1/2 of 1 per cent of the sum of the assessed valuation of the CBD property owned by participating property owners. The CBD assessment formula may be based on assessed valuation, building or parcel square footage, street frontage, or any other criteria which meets the objectives of the CBD. It shall be permissible for different rates to apply to different classifications of property or to different zones within the district. The CBD corporation, through its management plan, shall have the option to limit or cap the maximum CBD assessment imposed on individual properties or the total annual revenue generated by CBD assessments in any one year. The management plan may also provide for a phase-in period of not more than 3 years, with assessments increasing over such phase-in period.

(b) All CBD property shall be subject to a CBD assessment that is reasonably proportionate to the benefit to be received by the property owner, except for the following exempt property owners:

(i) Any residential property with a homeowner eligible for a real property tax exemption established by statute, or local ordinance or bylaw shall not be subject to a CBD assessment.

(ii) Tax-exempt CBD property owners, including but not limited to governmental entities, shall not be subject to CBD assessments, but may elect to support the implementation of the CBD management plan through voluntary payment of money or contribution of in-kind services and become a participating CBD property owner by executing a binding written agreement.

(iii) The CBD corporation, in its sole discretion, may grant a hardship waiver to any property owner pursuant to the waiver criteria established within the CBD management plan. The CBD corporation may also approve in-kind contributions or services in addition to, or in lieu of, a CBD assessment upon execution of a written agreement with a participating property owner.

Section 7. Collection and disbursement of CBD assessments; liens

(a) Unless another collection mechanism is set forth in the approved CBD management plan, the collector or treasurer of the municipality shall collect CBD assessments and disburse the funds to the CBD corporation. In addition to the items identified in section 3A of chapter 60, the collector or treasurer may include notices for CBD assessments in the envelope or electronic message in which a real property tax bill is sent. The collector or treasurer shall disburse collected CBD assessments to the CBD corporation not later than 30 days after the collection of such assessments, together with any interest earned on those assessments.

(b) Funds disbursed by the collector or treasurer to the CBD corporation shall be expended by the CBD corporation solely to further the goals and activities identified and approved in the CBD management plan. In addition to receiving the CBD assessments, the CBD corporation may receive grants, donations, and revenues generated from services funded by the CBD corporation, including but not limited to parking fees.

(c) Following establishment of the CBD, all CBD assessments billed by or on behalf of the CBD corporation and unpaid after 30 days from the date of billing shall become a lien on the property, with priority over all other liens except liens in favor of the commonwealth or the United States, municipal liens and prior mortgages of record. The CBD corporation shall file notice of the lien in the appropriate registry of deeds or land court registry district and may enforce the lien arising under this section following the procedures, and subject to the same limitations, as apply to a municipal tax lien arising under section 37 of chapter 60.

Section 8. Amendments

At any time after the establishment of a community benefit district pursuant to this chapter, the CBD corporation may petition the municipality to amend the boundaries of the district, the CBD management plan, or the bylaws of the CBD corporation. Any amendment to the CBD assessments, a material change in the use of the CBD funds, and any change in the boundaries of the district shall be approved in the same manner and be subject to the same approval criteria as an original petition; provided, however, that if the petition concerns an amendment to expand the district, the petition shall be required to meet the approval criteria in clauses (i) and (ii) of subsection (a) of section 4 for the expanded area rather than the district as a whole.

Section 9. Dissolution

(a) A community benefit district may be dissolved upon (i) a majority vote of the CBD corporation's board of directors, ratified by a vote of the participating property owners who are responsible for paying more than 50 per cent of the total CBD assessments levied in the district; provided, however, if any participating property owner, or group of related property owners as determined under subsection (b) of section 4, will pay more than 20 percent of the proposed CBD assessments, then for purposes of determining compliance with the 50 percent threshold, the amount of CBD assessment attributable to such property owner or group of related property owners shall be reduced to an amount equal to 20 percent of the total CBD assessments; and (ii) the dissolution of the CBD corporation in accordance with section 11 and other applicable provisions of chapter 180. No district shall be dissolved until the CBD corporation has satisfied or paid in full all of its outstanding indebtedness, obligations and liabilities; until funds are on deposit and available therefore or until a repayment schedule has been formulated and approved by the municipal chief executive officer.

(b) Upon any dissolution in accordance with said section 11 of said chapter 180, the existence of the CBD corporation shall cease, subject to applicable provisions of law for continuation to close its affairs, for the appointment of receivers and for revival. Upon

dissolution, the CBD corporation shall not incur any new or increased financial obligations.

(c) Any liabilities, either current or future, incurred as a result of action to accomplish the purposes of the CBD management plan shall not be an obligation of the municipality. Liabilities of a CBD corporation shall be paid for entirely from CBD assessments, revenue derived from the project or facilities owned by the CBD corporation and other assets, if any, of the CBD corporation.

(d) Upon the dissolution of a district, any remaining assets of the CBD corporation shall be refunded to the participating property owners by applying the same formula used to calculate the fee in the fiscal year in which the district is dissolved, or otherwise shall be distributed as ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction.

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Section 87 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutional and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

Section 87 seeks to clarify the borrowing authorization for capital improvements to Massachusetts Bay Community College by restricting the location of a new allied health academic facility to the city of Framingham.

The selection of siting for such a facility, however, must be made pursuant to a competitive procurement process that takes into consideration multiple factors, including overall costs. While this proposal offers helpful clarification, the College needs expanded flexibility to meet its operational and capital needs most effectively.

For these reasons, I recommend that Section 87 be amended by striking out the text and inserting in place thereof the following text:-

SECTION 87. Item 7066-8000 of section 2 of chapter 258 of the acts of 2008, as amended by section 5 of chapter 237 of the acts of 2014, is hereby further amended by

striking out, in line 68, the word "at" and inserting in place thereof the following words:-
in the Metrowest area of the Commonwealth for.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Section 109 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutions and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

Section 109 establishes the threshold for fiscal year 2018 that will determine whether any transfer of capital gains tax revenue will be made to the Stabilization Fund under Section 5G of Chapter 29 of the General Laws. That threshold is too low to guarantee a Stabilization Fund transfer. Under current Department of Revenue estimates of capital gains, that estimate will result in, at most, a \$25 million transfer in fiscal year 2018, and could result in no transfer at all.

This is well below the \$51.5 million transfer expected in each branch’s budget. Accordingly, I propose to leave the statutory threshold in place, and establish \$51.5 million as a floor for any such transfers during fiscal year 2018.

For these reasons, I recommend that Section 109 be amended by striking out the text and inserting in place thereof the following text:-

SECTION 109. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, for fiscal year 2018, the comptroller shall transfer from the General Fund to the Stabilization Fund the

greater of (a) \$51,500,000, or (b) the amount that is required to be transferred pursuant to section 5G of chapter 29 of the General Laws for fiscal year 2018.

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Section 125 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutions and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

Section 125 requires the Commissioner of Revenue to report on how he has used the authority granted in the budget to depart from federal requirements for 1099-K reporting. 1099-K reporting is carried out during the first two months of a calendar year, and the affected taxpayers may file the affected returns and pay their taxes as late as October of that calendar year.

Thus, a report as of March 15 of that calendar year will not be able to provide meaningful fiscal information. A reporting date of March 15, 2019 will allow for the preparation of a meaningful evaluation of the fiscal impact of this initiative.

For these reasons, I recommend that Section 125 be amended by striking out the text and inserting in place thereof the following text:-

SECTION 125. Not later than March 15, 2018, the commissioner of revenue shall issue a report on the use of his authority to add reporting requirements pursuant to section 8 of

chapter 62C of the General Laws. The report shall detail and provide an explanation for any changes made to the reporting requirements that differ from those required by the federal government, and state a projected fiscal impact resulting from any such changes. Not later than March 15, 2019, the commissioner of revenue shall issue a report describing the financial impact to the commonwealth of such additional reporting requirements, if any. The reports under this section shall be filed with the clerks of the senate and house of representatives, the chairs of the joint committee on revenue and the chairs of the senate and house committees on ways and means.

Pursuant to Article LVI, as amended by Article XC, Section 3 of the Amendments to the Constitution, I am returning to you for amendment Section 138 of House Bill No. 3800, “An Act Making Appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2018 for the Maintenance of the Departments, Boards, Commissions, Institutions and Certain Activities of the Commonwealth, for Interest, Sinking Fund and Serial Bond Requirements and for Certain Permanent Improvements.”

Section 138 establishes a commission, chaired by the commissioner of public health, to evaluate ways to increase access and promote the utilization of public health data, specifically data contained within the trauma registry, to study the effects of healthcare inequality.

While I support the objectives of this proposal, the creation of a commission is not necessary, nor an effective use of limited resources at the department of public health. Rather than establishing a special commission, the department of public health is committed to reporting the requested analysis to the Legislature by the December 31, 2018 deadline contained in Section 138.

For these reasons, I recommend that Section 138 be amended by striking out the text and inserting in place thereof the following text:-

SECTION 138. The department of public health shall evaluate ways to utilize data collected from the trauma registry to: promote public health, study the patterns and

impact of healthcare inequality and develop support programs to meet the unmet needs of residents of the commonwealth affected by healthcare inequality and their families. The department may consider methods to encourage partnerships with academic medical centers and schools of public health to analyze and interpret existing data collected by the commonwealth, including data collected through the trauma registry, to ascertain geographical differences in healthcare access and quality. Said evaluation shall include costs associated with any proposed uses or analytics of data.

The department shall issue a report of its findings and recommendations together with any recommendations for legislation with the clerks of the senate and the house of representatives on or before December 31, 2018.
